EDDINGTON VETERAN CHARLIE GROVER

Charles "Charlie" Grover was born on a cold, December 27, 1937 in Eddington, Maine. His parents were Clarence and Lena (Libby) Grover. He went to Eddington School, which was a one room school house across from the existing Eddington Elementary, then onto the East Eddington Elementary school, and he graduated from Brewer High School in 1956. He was drafted in 1961 and was sent to Fort Dix for boot camp, then Fort Chaffee for training in advanced infantry and heavy weapons, then to Scofield, Hawaii for more training, to Thailand, and then back to Hawaii. During his time, he was a chief mechanic and a ¾-ton truck driver. He helped





with miscellaneous carpentry projects when asked. One time while the troop was out a jeep broke down and with the assistance of an interpreter and lots of hand signals, he was able to obtain replacement parts from a Thai

service station and repair some broken bearing and another time replaced a complete engine with the help of a local repair shop. Charlie was always doing what was needed.

He was active duty for two years and then inactive duty for another two. When asked if he wanted to reenlist, he replied, "I ain't stupid!" He did his duty and was ready to come back home to Eddington.

He built his home for his family right next to his childhood home. He married Susan (Foster) and they had four children. They now have nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren with another due in March 2018. He and his wife are enjoying a simple retirement, living not 800 feet from where he was born.

She enjoyed traveling to Prince Edward Island, to camp at Beech Hill Pond and entertaining family reunions at her home. Kay leaves her husband Bud and three children, Mary, Warren, Norman and his wife Susan; six grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and three great-grandchildren and her sister Joyce Caldwell. A memorial service honoring Kay's life was held at the Clifton United Baptist Church.



Thank you to everybody who contributed a pie!





Eddington Pudding

2 ½ quarts boiling milk
1 cup commeal
1 cup water
½ tsp salt

½ tsp ginger ½ tsp. cinnamon 1 cup molasses 3 sweet apples

Pour the boiling milk on the commeal, add the other ingredients in order, and the apples cut in eighths. Bake in a covered deep pudding dish for four hours.


